PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The amazing and storied history of our Society and Plastic Surgery in New York, as recently outlined by Dr. Joseph G. McCarthy in his talk as he accepted the annual Lifetime Achievement Award, showed the tremendous impact that we have had and will continue to have in the future. I look forward to working with our amazingly talented Board on numerous projects to continue to benefit our membership.

We have exciting educational programming lined up for the rest of the year with the theme of 'Controversies in Plastic Surgery' as its background. On April 30th, the series will look at 'The Use of Social Media and Online Networking in Plastic Surgery' as well as 'Recent Advances in VTE Prophylaxis'. Our Annual Meeting in December will look at all facets of Breast Implants including all technical aspects and implant types. Specifically, as this issue goes to press, the New York State budget is still in limbo and, for the first

time in memory, contains substantive provisions for medical liability reform including a \$250k cap on non-economic damages and a neurologically impaired fund. Never before has New York State been closer to passing meaningful liability reform and Plastic Surgeons have been right in the middle of pressing the issue with the state legislature. In addition, New York plastic surgeons this year will once again face a battle on the dental scope of practice issue and we will again turn to our members for grassroots support.

WE HAVE REALIZED THE IMPORTANCE OF MOBILIZING OUR GRASSROOTS EFFORTS ON THE ADVOCACY FRONT

On the federal front, while the ACA (Accountable Care Act) healthcare reform bill gets tossed around in Congress and, it appears, will ultimately be settled in the courts, there appears to be one facet that is here to stay no matter what happens. That aspect involves the seven pages of the bill surrounding Accountable Care Organizations (ACO). Given its bipartisan support and a projected implementation date of January 1st, 2012, this initiative will affect all physicians including plastic surgeons. The description of an ACO, while lengthy, basically involves groups that will look

SCIENTIFIC PROGRAM

Winter 2010 Meeting

It was a fabulous day of very exciting lectures. Our first lecturer was **Dr. Arthur Swift** a plastic surgeon from Montreal Canada who presented mathematical concepts of facial beauty. The main emphasis was on the Golden Ratio or that everything in nature that is deemed attractive has a ratio of 1.618:1. He gave examples in the art world, architectural world, and of course in the human form. These principles were then applied to the way he approaches facial rejuvenation with facial fillers and neuromodulators. It was a very animated and enjoyable lecture.

Dr. Seth Matarasso a dermatologist from San Francisco gave an excellent talk on the current state of neuromodulators. He reviewed the characteristics of the current modulators available on the market today and discussed potential new products soon to be available. This included a topical form of Botulinum toxin that is currently in Phase 3 trials for treatment of the crow's feet. Dr. Matarasso presented nuances in injection techniques for improving results and reviewed treatment of complications related to injection of neuromodulators. All in all a great lecture.

Dr. Jeffrey Dover a dermatologist from Massachusetts presented developments in lasers, lights, and energy sources. These systems are nice adjunctive tools to consider having in the

office. He reviewed the etiology and treatment of acne and discussed his approach to this disorder. His primary regimen was topical and oral medications. He found that most lasers, and light sources only complimented but did not replace the medication regimen. He felt that other than using Thermage, most skin tightening systems were not effective. As for the emerging body contouring systems, he felt that cryolipolysis seemed to be the most promising.

Our final lecture was part of our Masters Series. **Dr. Gustave A. Colon**, from Louisiana gave a wonderful lecture on the history of plastic surgery with emphasis on the experience in New Orleans. He traced the history of Charity Hospital and its many different forms over the years, including historical "nuggets" and tales of the various surgeons who directed the plastic surgical service. It was really something special.

Our next meeting will take place on April 30, 2010. This scientific meeting will look at "Point Counterpoint: Experts Debate the Issues." Speakers will include Neal Reisman MD, Grant Stevens MD, Karol Gutowski MD, and Geoffrey Keyes, MD.

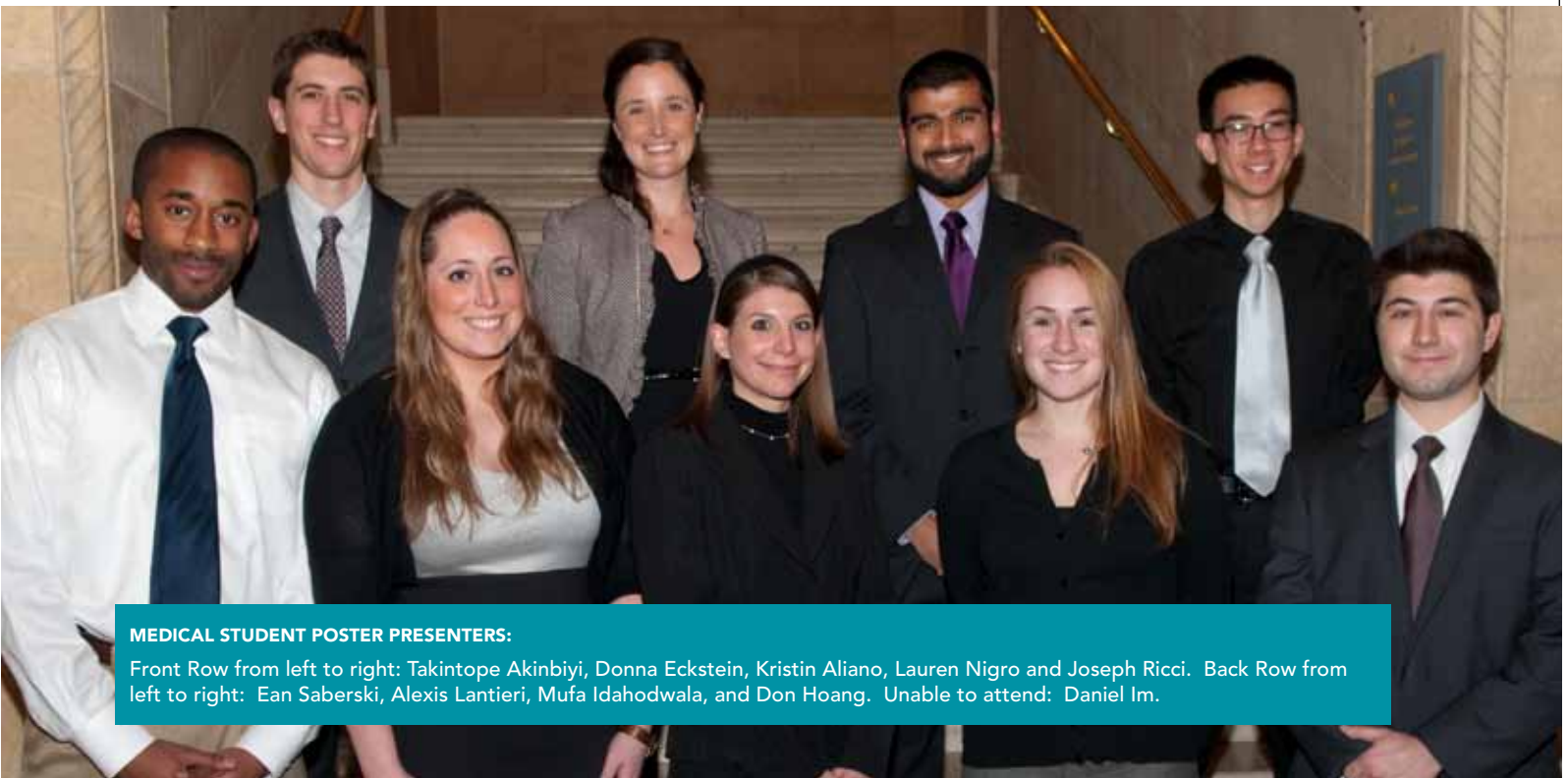

5TH ANNUAL LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

The 5th Annual Lifetime Achievement Award was presented at Residents' Night 2011. This year's recipient was Joseph G. McCarthy, MD, Lawrence D. Bell Professor of Surgery Director, Institute of Reconstructive Plastic Surgery-NYU Langone Medical Center

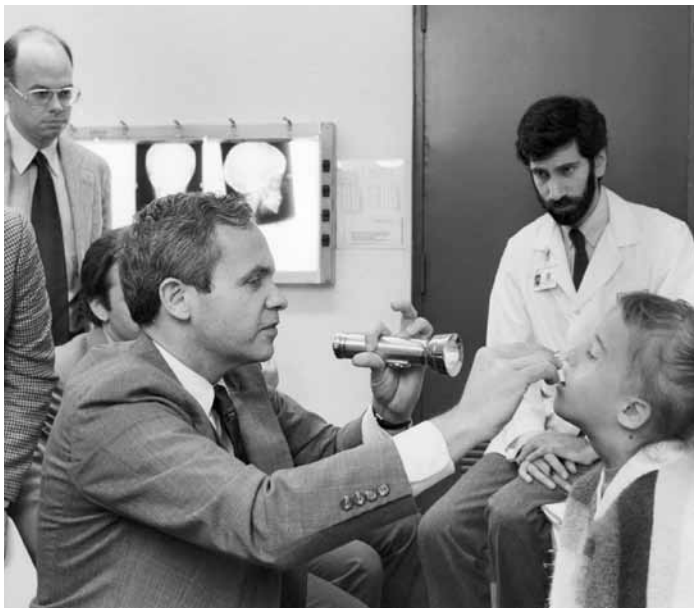
We were honored this year to have Joseph G. McCarthy, MD accept our Lifetime Achievement Award. The award recognizes a lifetime of contributions to plastic surgery.

Dr. McCarthy's life's work has been treating patients with facial deformity. He has also dedicated himself to the training of plastic surgeons and the advancement of craniofacial surgery.

Dr. McCarthy received his medical degree from Columbia University and he completed his General Surgery Residency there. He trained in Plastic Surgery at the Institute of Reconstructive Plastic Surgery. In 1981 he was appointed Director of the Institute. Dr. McCarthy has trained over 144 residents and 30 craniofacial fellows. Graduates of the program have gone on to become plastic surgery department chairmen in more than 20 universities worldwide. Dr. McCarthy developed the technique of craniofacial distraction and published the first textbook on the subject. He has published more than 350 scientific papers and book chapters.

Dr. McCarthy has worked tirelessly to promote access to treatment for patients with craniofacial deformity, regardless of the patient's ability to pay. He is a Trustee of the national Foundation for Facial Reconstruction and the Founding Chairman of the Medical Advisory Board of Smile Train.

In recognition of his contributions, Dr. McCarthy has received over 60 prestigious awards. It was indeed an honor to have him accept our heartfelt award. As plastic surgeons we always acknowledge that we stand on the shoulders of those who came before us. Dr. McCarthy's contributions have directly impacted each of us and our patients. We were so pleased to be able to thank Dr. McCarthy for his contributions and pay tribute to a man who has helped so many people.

YOU AIN'T SEEN NOTHING YET

I had a whole different article written for this newsletter until Governor Cuomo took Medical Malpractice reform – or actually a \$250,000 cap on pain and suffering, out of his budget proposal. The Medical Society of the State of New York supported his Medicaid/budget proposals, but only if the budget incorporated the cap and the neurologically impaired infant bill. We all knew that Assemblyman Silver opposed this. He has told us time and time again that he would pass this “over his dead body”; however, we thought that Cuomo might have included it because he felt that there was a chance of it passing since there were other programs in the budget bill that would force Silver to allow it to pass. That was not the case. Out it came.

Physicians called their legislators and expressed their feeling, but politics again ruled the day. Were we played as fools? I don't think so, because an independent panel had put through the 79 changes, all of which we could have lived with if Med Mal reform was included. We also had the support of the Hospital Association of New York (HAYNYs) and SEIU – 1199. They all signed on and put millions of dollars into an ad campaign promoting the changes including medical malpractice reform. The changes would have given each physician with MLMIC insurance at least a 25% reduction. It also would have saved hospitals hundreds of millions of dollars in malpractice premiums and would have freed up monies for staffing.

It seemed as if it might happen, but when push came to shove, we lost, again.

Now what do we do? MSSNY's PAC is reevaluating who we will give money to. We have frozen all contributions until our house of delegates (which is the second weekend in

April) discusses the scheduling of contributions. Even though the Democrats give us all of the changes we want regarding managed care organizations, they give us nothing in the malpractice realm. But again, we must be realists and understand that only physicians and other healthcare providers care about med mal reform. Our patients want to be able to sue for as much as they can. Until there is a crisis and malpractice insurance is not available, or physicians go out of business or hold a job action as they did in California in the '70s, nothing is going to change.

The trial lawyers have such a powerful grasp on our legislature that it is hard to combat them. They have put all sorts of misleading articles in local papers and tell people that malpractice reform will deprive harmed patients of their justice in the court system, which we all know is false. Only pain and suffering would have been capped, losses for economic and medical reasons were not capped. Also, no one would be stopped from suing for alleged medical malpractice.

Other changes that were taken out of the budget bill would have required testimony against a physician by a physician Board Certified in the same specialty and would have required both sides to disclose the identity of the witness and would have strengthened the Certificate of Merit.

Looks like we are back at base one, except for the fact that the neurologically impaired infant funding mechanism was left in the budget. A small but important feat especially for the OBs and hospitals.

We must continue to push for tort reform and also an Ethics bill that requires our legislators to disclose their outside income. Assemblyman Speaker Silver is associated with the law firm of Weitz and Luxenberg and takes home an undisclosed income. I believe that he singlehandedly prevented tort reform from passing in the New York Legislature this year.

I hope I have better news in the next newsletter.

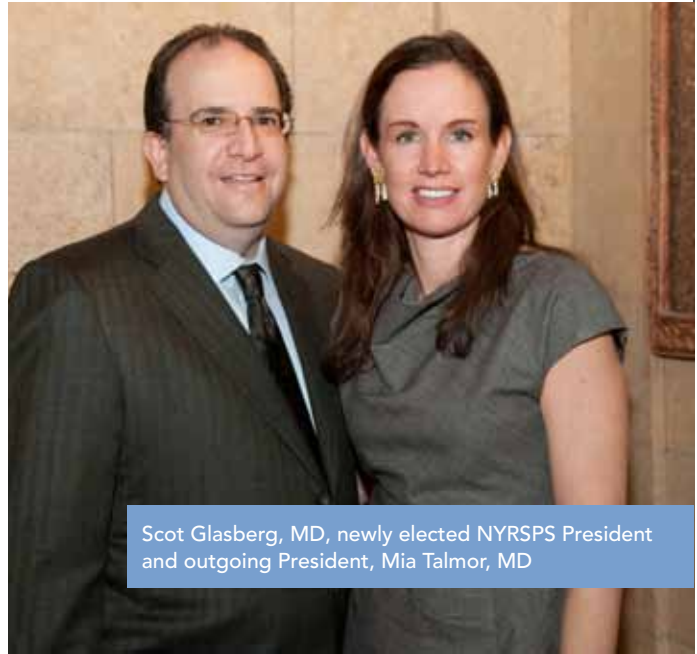
